The Carbon Footprint

A carbon footprint is a measure of the impact our activities have on the environment, and in particular climate change. It is connected to the amount of greenhouse gases produced in our day-to-day lives through burning fossil fuels for electricity, heating and transportation etc. The carbon footprint is a measurement of all greenhouse gases we individually produce and has units of tonnes (or kg) of carbon dioxide. A carbon footprint is made up of the sum of two parts, the primary footprint and the secondary footprint .

1. The primary footprint is a measure of our direct emissions of CO_2 from the burning of fossil fuels including domestic energy consumption and transportation (e.g. car and plane). We have direct control of these.

2. The secondary footprint is a measure of the indirect CO_2 emissions from the whole lifecycle of products we use - those associated with their production and eventual breakdown. To put it very simply – the more we buy the more emissions will be caused on our behalf.
